



We have a new event happening March 29 in Sioux Falls. It is called "Swine and Dine." This event is designed to showcase a restaurant and pork entrees. Ode to Food will be hosting the event. During this evening event the attendees will enjoy a delicious meal with the opportunity to visit with pig farmers about their farms and how their pigs are raised.

Lobbyist Report

Lorin Pankratz

The 2021 Legislative Session was more interesting than many in the past for several reasons. One, with somewhere between \$3-4 million in "extra revenues," special appropriation requests were increasingly creative as the days wore on. Governor Noem made some early proposals that took up about half of the extra revenues, not all of which she was able to hang on to. One example of this is her request for \$100 million for Broadband infrastructure improvements, with the money going to the Governor's Office of Economic Development. A very worthwhile investment for all of South Dakota, and in particular our farmers and ranchers, however the legislature reduced that amount to \$75 million, as they had some ideas of their own!

It was also interesting to see what legislators would decide was worth spending some of the extra revenues on and what was not. In most Legislative Sessions, legislators fight about what to cut in the budgeting process, not where to spend, even though they remained mostly frugal.

The Governor proposed building a new beef facility on the State Fair grounds. The legislature approved spending a total of \$20 million for the new facility, with \$12 million in general funds and the other \$8 million coming from insurance proceeds and other donations.

SDSU benefitted through judicious use of extra revenues, including a new \$15 million Dairy Barn, with half coming from general funds and the other half coming from other private sources. The new Dairy Barn was not a request that came from SDSU through the Board of Regents, so it was a little more difficult to achieve, but was accomplished under the leadership of Rep. Larry Tidemann, Brookings. Additionally, there will be a new BioProducts facility to be built in the Brookings Research park. This is a cooperative effort between SDSU and the School of Mines, showing how two of our universities can work together on something this significant. The \$20 million endeavor was the number two priority for the Board of Regents.

There was also a special appropriations request for \$25 million to renovate and expand the Meat Laboratory at SDSU. This was also not on anyone's list, but came about because of the extra revenues. In the end, this did not make it, but there was considerable discussion about the need and the request will be made again in the future as the lab does need to be upgraded.

Additionally, the Governor had proposed \$5 million in grants for small meat processing facilities. Legislators found other revenues that could be used for this program, which is now up and running. Please let the small meat processors in your area know about the program and contact the Ag Department for application information.

The legislature allocated \$6 million to go toward county and township bridge and road infrastructure improvements, over a two-year period. The first year will use funds to take inventory of structures and roads that need work and the second year will be to identify projects most in need. The money will flow through the counties to the townships and the townships will also need to make contributions to be eligible for funding.

There was a resolution brought forward to "disapprove" the merger of the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Environment and Natural Resources. The resolution was assigned to Senate Ag Committee and it did pass and was sent to the Senate floor for debate. The resolution failed on a 17/18 vote, needing a simple majority of 18 to pass. There was notice of intent to reconsider the vote, however the following day there was no motion to reconsider the vote, so the merger will stand. It is important to remember that every Governor has the authority to make changes within the Executive Branch of government. This particular change caught everyone in agriculture off guard, thereby making it harder to understand and approve. With that said, I think our producers

are obligated to let the leadership of this new Department and the Governor know when you think they are doing something



you agree or disagree with. Keep them on their toes!

A proposal to create an Interstate Cooperative Meatpacking Compact made it out of the House Ag Committee, primarily because House Speaker Spencer Gosch was the Prime Sponsor. The bill failed on the floor due to the work of Dr. Odekoeven, SDPPC, and other ag groups helping legislators understand that SD would most likely lose almost \$1 million in USDA funding as well as our State Meat Inspection program.

SB 52 was brought forward by DENR and supported by SDPPC, to change the General Permit from five years to 10 years. SCR 604 was a Resolution to remove barriers to county of origin labeling. We did not engage on this as it did not make any reference to pork.

Every 10 years a census of the U.S. takes place and those new population numbers are then used to determine any changes to be made in legislative districts in each state. Sen. Mary Duvall will be the Chair for the Senate Legislative Redistricting Committee, which will meet with a similar committee from the House when the 2020 census numbers are released in late September. These Legislative Committees will host several meetings across the state to gather public input, then prepare recommendations for the legislature to consider in a Special Session sometime in November 2021.



Ferlyn & Karen Hofer Family Honored as Family of the Year

The South Dakota Pork Producers Council recognized the Ferlyn and Karen Hofer Family with the 7th Annual Family of the Year Award during the Master Pork Producers Banquet on Wednesday, January 13, 2021.

The award was created to honor a pork-producing family who has contributed to the long-term success of the industry through leadership and pork promotion on the local, state or /and national level.

Ferlyn Hofer grew up on the family farm east of Canistota where his parents had a farrow to feeder pig, and eventually a farrow to finish farm. After graduation from Canistota High School in 1978, he started his own 75 sow farrow to finish operation using outside finishing lots one mile north of his parents' farm. In the early 1980's, even with high interest rates, he expanded his hog operation to 150 sows, built a new farrowing, nursery, and finishing barns.

Ferlyn and Karen were married in 1987 and over the years working together grew their sow herd to approximately 350 sows. In 1991 they purchased the original family farm where Ferlyn grew up and now the gestation and farrowing is located at the home farm and the nursey and finishers are at the farm Ferlyn started. They also raise corn and soybeans where they grind their own corn in their feed mill for feed for the sows and pigs.

They were blessed with three sons who grew up working on the farm.



All three sons are married now, and are still involved with the farming operation.

Ryan not only is the family's electrician but also crop farms with his parents, and also owns Great Plains Electric. His wife, Amber, teaches 2nd grade at Terry Redlin in Sioux Falls.

Tyler and DiAnn own and operate TH Custom Mfg. together where they make freestanding panels, garbage dumpsters and roll-off containers. That business was started on the home farm and has since moved into a larger facility at Wall Lake. He is also the family's welder when things need to be repaired.

After working as a lineman in North Dakota for a few years, Nolan returned to work full time on the family farm. He not only is involved in the day-today operations, but also manages the family's feed mill and crop farms. His wife, Krystal, works at the Ortman Clinic in Canistota and occasionally helps out in the gestation Barn breeding sows.

Both Ferlyn and Karen are active with SD Pork Producers Council with Ferlyn serving on the Executive Board and committees and as Past President. Karen is active on the Trade Show Committee and helps out with pork promotions. Ferlyn is currently a Supervisor for Greenland Township and past Cenex Board Member. They are members of United Church of Canistota where they have both served on Church Council.

They feel so privileged that their sons want to be involved on the farm and feel that the family bonds are strengthened when everyone has a part and works together.

Friend of the Industry: Dr. Dustin Oedekoven

State Veterinarian Dr. Dustin Oedekoven was honored as Friend of the Industry during the Master Pork Producers Banquet in January. The award recognizes individuals or businesses for their continued support of the pork industry.

Dusty grew up on a diversified livestock and grain farm east of Sturgis, SD. His family raised cattle, pigs, sheep, rabbits, and chickens. Dusty learned swine husbandry from his mother, who managed a small farrow to finish operation, selling finished pigs weekly at Philip Livestock Auction. Active involvement in 4-H and FFA also helped to foster his interest in animal agriculture.

Dusty studied at SDSU before attending Iowa State University College of Veterinary Medicine, logging nearly seven years of student employment in the veterinary diagnostic laboratories. While working with veterinary diagnosticians and researchers, he gained experience with PRRS virus, Porcine Circovirus, Swine Influenza



virus, and many other diseases of swine.

Dr. Oedekoven completed an equine internship in Sheridan, WY, before returning to South Dakota in 2003 to work as a staff veterinarian for the SD Animal Industry Board. In 2009 he was appointed as the Board's Executive Secretary and State Veterinarian. He became a Diplomate of the American College of Preventive Veterinary Medicine in 2015. Twice he has served in an interim capacity as the state Secretary of Agriculture. He is fortunate to work with a dedicated staff of veterinarians and other animal health and food safety professionals, as well as an extensive network of animal health and livestock industry partners. He currently serves as President Elect and Chairman of the Board of Directors of the U.S. Animal Health Association.

Among the many notable challenges of his tenure with the AIB have been the response to Winter Storm Atlas, emergence of Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea Virus, an outbreak of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza, the reemergence of Bovine tuberculosis, and continual planning for foreign animal disease preparedness and response. Among his greatest accomplishments has been guiding and participating in the cooperative effort of government, industry, and academia to build the expansion of the SDSU Animal Disease Research and Diagnostic Laboratory.

Dusty and his wife, Jenn, live in Pierre with their five children, ages 7-18. They enjoy ministry with Community Bible Church, boating on the Missouri River and visiting family in the Black Hills.

Kingsbury County Producer Earns Pork All-American

Shane Odegaard of Lake Preston, SD was honored with the 2020 Pork All-American Award during SDPPC"s Annual Pork Congress in January.

The award acknowledges pork producers or industry members who have established themselves as dedicated, involved business people and leaders in their communities.

Shane is part of Odegaard Family Farms, which includes himself, Justin & Jenna Odegaard, Randy & Glenda Odegaard, Michelle Malone, Shaun & Kristi Odegaard and his mother, Sharon Odegaard. They also have essential team member Ashley Pederson who is a key employee and part of their family farm.

Odegaard Family Farms is a diversified farm that consists of a 700-sow farrow to finish operation, 4,000 head contract nursery, cow/calf and feedlot operation. They also grow corn and soybeans.

Shane has four daughters Ashley (Ethan) Tolzin who is a nurse at Horizon Health, Danielle a Junior, Callie a 6th grader and Emsely a 4th grader at Lake Preston School.

Shane stays very active on the local level as he attends zoning hearings in support of legislation. Odegaard Elected SDPPC President




The South Dakota Pork Producers Council (SDPPC) elected Shane Odegaard, a pork producer from Lake Preston, SD, to serve as president.

U.S. & Canada Partner on ASF Protocol

USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) and the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) have developed a protocol to help ensure bilateral trade will continue if African swine fever (ASF) is detected in feral swine in either country, while still absent from domestic swine.

The intent of the protocol is to protect swine populations in both countries during an outbreak of ASF in feral swine, while minimizing impacts on the trade of live swine, swine products, and other swine commodities. Upon an ASF feral swine detection, all trade between both countries would initially stop. Then,

according to the protocol, trade would resume in three, progressive phases with increasingly reduced restrictions on live swine, swine germplasm, and untreated swine commodities.

"Continuing trade with Canada in the event of a feral African swine fever detection is important to our stakeholders, and this trade protocol provides the necessary guidance to minimize the impact to the swine industry," USDA Chief Veterinarian Dr. Burke Healey said. "This collaborative effort uses a science -based approach to ensure trade between both countries resumes as quickly as possible."

How quickly the U.S. and Canada establish initial control areas, initiate surveillance/case findings and removal in feral swine, and start surveillance in captive swine, will determine when they enter phase two of the protocol. During the third and final phase, trade restrictions are reduced to the boundaries of the established control area.

APHIS and CFIA are continuing to work with industry and other stakeholders to ensure that both countries have the processes and procedures in place to fully implement the protocol.



Pork-Inspired Recipes

Italían Sausage wíth Pasta and Herbs

Ingredients

1 pound Italian sausage 8 ounces rotini

1 Tbsp. olive oil 1 cup ricotta cheese (part skim)

2 cups zucchini (cubed) 2 Tbsp. dried herbs (basil, sage, parsely)

1/2 red bell pepper (diced) Parmesan cheese (freshly grated)

Directions

Cut sausage diagonally into 1-inch pieces and cook sausage in a large skillet over medium heat, turning to cook and brown evenly, about 10 to 15 minutes or until internal temperature reaches 160 degrees F. Set aside. Heat olive oil in a large skillet and add zucchini and red pepper. Cook over medium heat until tender but still crisp, about 3-4 minutes.

Cook the rotini according to the directions on the package. Drain and reserve 1 cup cooking water. Add pasta to skillet and stir in ricotta. Add 1/2 cup pasta water and stir until creamy. Stir in sausage. Add more water if mixture is too dry. Sprinkle with herbs and Parmesan cheese.

Spícy Asían Ground Pork Burgers

Ingredients

1 pound ground pork1 1/2 teaspoons garlic chili paste1 clove garlic (crushed)1 tablespoon fresh mint (minced)

1 tablespoon fresh ginger root (grated) 4 sandwich buns

2 tablespoons soy sauce

Directions

Mix together all ingredients except buns; form into 4 patties. Grill over medium-hot coals 10-12 minutes, turning once, about 5-6 minutes per side, until an instant read thermometer reads 160 degrees F. Serve on buns.

Jamaícan Rubbed Chops

Ingredients

4 ribeye (rib) pork chops (3/4-inch thick) 1/2 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons brown sugar 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

1 clove garlic (minced) 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves

1 teaspoon black pepper (coarsely ground)

Directions

Pat pork chops dry with paper toweling; stir together remaining ingredients in small bowl and rub chops on both sides with seasoning mixture. Grill chops over medium-hot coals, turning once, about 8-9 minutes, until internal temperature on a thermometer reads 145 degrees Fahrenheit, followed by a 3-minute rest time.

Chops with Hawaiian Marinade

Ingredients

4 porterhouse (bone-in loin) pork chops (3/4-inch thick) 2 Tbsp. sesame oil (dark)

12 oz. unsweetened pineapple juice (1 1/2 cups) 2 Tbsp. light brown sugar

2 scallions (white parts sliced into thin rounds) 3/4 tsp. Black pepper, freshly ground

3 Tbsp. ginger (peeled and minced) 1/2 tsp. coarse salt

3 Tbsp. soy sauce (reduced-sodium)

Directions

Mix pineapple juice, white parts of scallions, ginger, soy sauce, sesame oil, brown sugar, pepper and salt together in large, resealable bag. Add chops, seal bag and refrigerate for 2 to 10 hours.

Prepare a medium-hot fire in grill. Brush grill grate clean and lightly oil grate. Remove chops from marinade, shaking off excess marinade. Do not pat dry. Discard remaining marinade. Grill chops directly over heat, turning once, until internal temperature on a thermometer reads 145 degrees Fahrenheit, 8 to 10 minutes, followed by a 3-minute rest time.
