SDSU Students receive Pork Industry Scholarships

Three South Dakota State University students are among this year's recipients of the Lois Britt Memorial Pork Industry Scholarship. The \$2,500 award is for college students pursuing careers in the U.S. pork industry.

Among this year's winners are Joseph Halbur from Sioux City, IA; Kyra Schenk from Mission Hill, SD; and Karmen Sperr from Morris, MN. Kyra was the SDPPC 2021 Pork Ambassador

"We want to recognize these outstanding college students and their commitment to the U.S. pork industry," said outgoing NPPC President Terry Wolters, a producer from Pipestone, Minnesota. "Through the

Lois Britt and Neil Dierks scholarships, we are creating a talent pipeline for the next generation of industry leaders."

Karmen Sperr notes, "I feel greatly honored to be chosen as a recipient of the Lois Britt Memorial Scholarship. As an ag communicator, I enjoy learning about the various aspects of the pork industry and in turn, being able to advocate on behalf of swine farmers." She adds, "This scholarship will allow me to continue having experiences that will increase my knowledge and become a better communicator for the industry. It is also very gratifying to know that the National Pork Producers Council sees the potential I have as a young profes-




sional and that they want to invest in my development further.

According to Joseph Halibur, "Being awarded this scholarship is a great honor and will help to lessen the stress of paying for school, allowing me time to focus more on my education. Becoming an involved and respected member of the pork industry is a dream of mine, this scholarship has taken me one step closer to accomplishing my goal."

The Lois Britt Memorial Pork Industry Scholarship program, sponsored by CME Group and the National Pork Industry Foundation, is awarded to undergraduates in a two-year swine program or a four-year

college of agriculture program.

The scholarship program was introduced in 1990 and later renamed in 2006 in memoriam of Lois Britt, former NPPC board director. A lifetime supporter of agriculture, Britt spent 34 years with the North Carolina Cooperative Extension Service and finished her career after 15 years with Murphy-Brown LLC (now Smithfield) doing public and government relations. She was inducted into the NPPC Pork Industry Hall of Fame and the North Carolina Pork Council Hall of Fame and was awarded the North Carolina 4-H Lifetime Achievement Award, among many other achievements.




Maddie Larsen from Wolsey and Erika Schenk from Mission Hill served as the SDPPC Ambassadors for 2022.



Pork All American — Robert Rasmussen

Robert Rasmussen was honored this year as SD Pork All-American, recognizing a South Dakota pork farmer for leadership and involvement. Robert grew up on a family farm in Hurley, SD, and has been involved in the pork industry all his life. He runs a 600-sow farrow-to-finish operation, raising Duroc and Berkshire hogs for sale to Heritage Pork. Robert served on the SDPPC Executive Board and has done countless promotional events for the industry. He served for 25 years as Swine Superintendent for the Turner County Fair, and served as a volunteer at the pork stand. Robert also served on the National Pork Board's Swine Health Committee for six years, is on the Swine Advisory Board for SD 4-H and SD Summer Spotlight, and is a member of SD Swine Breeders. Robert has three children and two grandchildren, and is active in his community, serving on the Viborg Community Club, the Turner County Fair Board, and the local volunteer fire department. He also helps with Danish Days and the local food pantry.





Friend of the Industry— Ken Wintersteen

Ken Wintersteen, owner of the Menno Livestock sale barn for 27 years, was honored this year as Friend of the Industry. 

NPPC Elects New Officers, Board Members to Lead Advocacy Efforts

The National Pork Producers Council (NPPC) recently installed new officers and elected members to its board of directors at its annual business meeting, the National Pork Industry Forum.

Scott Hays of Monroe City, Missouri, was elevated to NPPC president for 2023-2024. Hays is a fifth-generation pork producer and has been involved in many aspects of production. While owning sows and production facilities remains the farm's core business, he enjoys involvement in the sixth generation's swine management, swine building maintenance and livestock hauling businesses. He also represents producers on various state and national committees, including the Missouri Pork Association Board, Missouri Corn Growers Association, Missouri Agrileaders of Tomorrow president, Missouri Farm Bureau, Monroe City FFA Alumni and Missouri Institute of Cooperatives.

Hays takes over for Terry Wolters, producer from Pipestone, Minnesota, who becomes NPPC immediate past president.

Lori Stevermer became NPPC president-elect. Stevermer is co-owner of Trail's End Farm in Easton, Minnesota, where she served on the executive board of the Minnesota Pork Producers Association. Stevermer has a history of advocating for the pork industry at the local, state and national levels.

Lobbyist Report

Blood, toil, tears, and sweat

The SD Legislature adjourned the Main Run of the 2023 Session on March 9 at 6:59 p.m., after finalizing spending proposals, approving the FY24 state budget, and thanking the cast of thousands who made the whole thing possible.

At one time there was a glimmer of hope that the legislature could finish their work early in the week. However, those hopes evaporated as legislators were debating ways to provide tax relief for South Dakotans. The House made it abundantly clear that they had no enthusiasm for repealing the grocery tax. The Senate was pushing for property tax relief for homeowners. In the end, legislators agreed to reduce the general sales and use tax rate from 4.5% to 4.2%. This will reduce sales taxes in South Dakota by approximately \$104 million each year. The proposal contains a four-year sunset clause, meaning that the tax rate will go back up to 4.5% in 2027 unless the legislature changes the law.

In case you are curious or aren't interested in doing math, this will save you thirty cents in sales taxes for every \$100 you spend.

History is written by the victors

Looking back over the past three months, there are a number of successes we can identify. SDPPC supported legislation to improve protections for ag operations against frivolous nuisance lawsuits. Several pork producers were in attendance when Governor Noem signed this bill at a special ceremony in Mitchell. We also supported a bill to clarify the vote required by county zoning boards to approve conditional use permits.

Among special appropriations approved by the legislature are:

- An additional \$3 million for the bioproducts facility in Brookings
- \$5.8 million to fix ag buildings at

SDSU damaged last year in the derecho

- An additional \$9 million for the DEX building at the State Fairgrounds
- \$5 million for grants to school districts for career and technical education equipment.

Legislators turned down a proposal dictating who can or cannot use the title "veterinary technician," as well as a bill that would require landowners to allow unfettered access to abandoned cemeteries.

One of the issues that consumed a lot of time and media attention was what to do about concerns over foreign ownership of agricultural land. Since 1979, South Dakota las has restricted foreign ownership to no more than 160 acres. In December, the Governor announced plans to bring in legislation creating a fivemember "Committee on Foreign Investment in the United States - South Dakota." This committee would screen agricultural land sales and leases and make a recommendation to the governor about whether the transaction should be approved. The governor would have final authority to approve or deny the sale or lease.

Agricultural groups consistently expressed support for the goal outlined by the governor, but opposition for the mechanism contained in the bill. After numerous meetings with stakeholders and the concentrated efforts of ag groups, the governor's bill was defeated.

Special thanks to SDPPC President Adam Krause who made a trip to Pierre to testify in opposition to the bill during the Senate Ag Committee hearing. Adam did an excellent job of expressing support for food security, but outlining specific concerns with the bill. The bill was defeated in the Senate.

Meanwhile, a bill from Rep. Will Mortenson to improve reporting requirements from foreign landown-



ers, received unanimous approval from the legislature and was signed by the Governor.

The conversation will continue this summer. A group of legislators, ag groups, realtors, bankers, and others will be analyzing whether our current law is working or if changes need to be made to promote national security.

It is noteworthy that there are only eight legislators who list agriculture as their business and three others who list their occupation as agriculture/business. It is incumbent upon producers to be in contact with their elected legislators to help them understand what modern agriculture is and how it works. It is also important for organizations like SDPPC to look at their leadership and membership for potential candidates for office. Other industries do that and we don't want to be left behind.

For those who like to plan ahead, the 2024 Legislative Session will begin on January 9. The Main Run will end on March 7, with March 25 set aside for Veto Day.

Jamaícan Rubbed Chops



Ingredients

4 ribeye (rib) pork chops (3/4-inch thick)

2 Tbsp. brown sugar1 clove garlic (minced)

1 tsp. black pepper (coarsely ground)

1/2 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. nutmeg

1/4 tsp. ground cloves

Directions: Pat pork chops dry with paper toweling; stir together remaining ingredients in small bowl and rub chops on both sides with seasoning mixture. Grill chops over medium-hot coals, turning once, about 8-9 minutes, until internal temperature on a thermometer reads 145 degrees Fahrenheit, followed by a 3-minute rest time.
